## **Centrality of the Program to the Institutional Mission**

The Criminal Justice Department mission is critical to the institutional mission. The mission of the Criminal Justice Department at Eastern Oklahoma State College is dedicated to providing the course of study necessary for a transferable Associate of Science Degree for students interested in a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice to include correction, criminology, juvenile delinquency, law enforcement, forensics and pre-law. The Collegiate Officer Program (COP) option of the department is committed to providing the curriculum and practical exercises necessary for certification as an Oklahoma peace officer. The Criminal Justice Department is further committed to providing the knowledge and skills to be job ready as an Oklahoma peace officer in the duties of preservation of public peace, protection of life and property, prevention of crime, serving of warrants and enforcement of laws and ordinances of the State of Oklahoma.

Associate of Science Degree (Criminal Justice option {with online option} and Collegiate Officer program option).

## **Program Goals & Learning Objectives**

### **Departmental Goals**

In order to accomplish its mission, the Criminal Justice Department will, within the limitations of available resources:

- 1) Provide a core of courses reflecting the theoretical understanding, job duties and ethics of the professional agencies within the Criminal Justice field.
  - 2) Present a pedagogical approach wherein students may acquire the knowledge and skills comparable to the first two years of a baccalaureate program in Criminal Justice.
  - 3) Incorporate technology in the classroom to promote a learning styles environment.
  - 4) Provide access to the tools, practical exercise and professionals necessary to acquire the knowledge and skills for immediate employment and job performance in Law Enforcement (Collegiate Officer Program only).
  - 5) Provide access to the technological tools available to conduct scenarios and practical exercises in specific job duties and tasks of the Law Enforcement Officer (Collegiate Officer Program only).
  - 6) Promote understanding, communications, and a working relationship between the criminal justice department, the students and professional agencies of Criminal Justice through the instructors ensuring contact between the field and the classroom.
  - 7) Solicit tutorial services and learning resources from student support services to assist program majors.
  - 8) Demonstrate and provide individualized, pro-active academic and career advisement for both traditional and non-traditional students in their pursuit of higher education and employment with an agency of criminal justice.

- 8)** Have conducted themselves in a safe and effective manner in all aspects of firearms' carry, storage, and training at a controlled firing range. (Collegiate Officer Program only)
- 9)** Possess the knowledge and skill necessary to satisfactorily accomplish the field/uniformed officer's investigative duties and responsibilities associated with being the first to discover or arrive at the scene of a crime. (Collegiate Officer Program only)
- 10)** Know how to locate, interpret, enforce and issue citations under Oklahoma's vehicle laws. (Collegiate Officer Program only)
- 11)** Know how to respond to the scene of an accident, protect the scene, collect evidence, conduct an investigation and accomplish the required traffic collision and operator's financial responsibility reports. (College Officer program only)

### **Demand for Program**

Student enrollments clearly justify the demand for the Criminal Justice Program. The department's average headcount (including both the Criminal Justice Option and the COP Option) for past five years has been 79 students enrolled.

Another justification for a strong Criminal Justice Program is the impact created by Oklahoma's stand on "get tough on crime" which has created overcrowded prisons and a demand for law enforcement and correctional employees alike.

## Resources Required for Program

### Financial Support:

An annual budget is prepared to meet the financial requirements of the Criminal Justice Department. This budget is scrutinized by Eastern's administrative officers and then disseminated the division head and/or department head for appropriate use in teaching criminal justice students. In addition to this budget allotment, a special fee is attached to the skills courses (firearms, custody and control and LEDT) for the purpose of supplementing the departmental budget to cover the additional expenses generated by the COP option.

### Library Collections

The library media center has books numbering in the hundreds that are dedicated to criminal justice topics as well as six magazine or newsletter subscriptions. The media center also has the complete set of the Oklahoma Statutes for student use. The library also utilizes the latest electronic resources available for research. (Source: Mary Edith Butler, December 2005)

### Facilities

The Criminal Justice Department has a dedicated classroom, office complex and safe rooms. Courses are also offered through the extension campus in McAlester and as online courses. The dedicated classroom is utilized for all criminal justice class lectures, guest speakers and such practical exercise as fingerprinting and crime scene analysis. The parking area just behind Choctaw Hall is utilized for traffic stop simulations. The office complex houses one full time faculty members as well as all records for the department including COP files for each COP student receiving his/her CLEET certification. The safe room is designed with steel doors and bars for the purpose of short term storage of ammunition and firearms as well as all supplies needed for practical exercises conducted in the COP option. In addition to the dedicated classroom the COP option requires a room for safe and secure presentation of custody and control course. The course is currently being presented in the Stipe Center room 201 or Field House gym when available. For completion of the driving course the students and COP director must travel and stay in Oklahoma City and use the driving course at the OSU-OKC (Oklahoma State University) training center or partner with East Central University in Ada. The firing range is located on college property and shared with community law enforcement and firefighters agencies.

### Support Services

Support services include custodial, physical plant, campus police, food services, bookstore, business office, freshman counselors, financial aid, public information, office perspective students, student services, academic affairs, audio-visual and technical services, student support services and the office of the president.

### Use of technology in instructional design and delivery

Computer, internet, interactive television, Firearms Training Systems or equivalent, and photography are among the technologies required and used in classroom delivery.

### Program Uniqueness

The Criminal Justice Department provides academic and tactical experiences for the student who proposes to enter employment in the criminal justice field. Full time, academically credentialed instructors, videos, guest lecturers and professionally credentialed adjunct instructors are enhanced by the uniqueness of professionals and future professionals sitting side by side in the classroom. Some of the students enrolled in the major classes are already employed in the criminal justice field. Correctional officers, police officers and support staff are among the students who have chosen to come back to college for career advancement. Having these individuals in class along with students who have no work experience truly enhances the academic experiences. Classroom discussion moves beyond a theoretical base straight into reality.

The nature of law enforcement and the mission of the Criminal Justice Department to have the students job ready as certified police officers combines for a uniqueness of classroom presentation and requirement. Students must learn safe utilization of semi-automatic weapons and 12 gauge shotguns before they use live ammunition on a firing range as a part of their requirements. Placing students behind the wheel of a car to educate them in the proper procedure and safety in police pursuit scenarios gives new meaning to a "non-traditional" classroom. These features along with many other practical exercises required in the COP option makes the program unique when compared to any program.

### Instructional Cost

The approximate instructional cost for the Criminal Justice Department is not available because again, the dissemination of such information has not been made available by a centralized office as was the case when the Office of Marketing and Enrollment Management provided the Standard Field of Study Cost per FTE for the different departments.

### Faculty/Student Ratio

The average class size over the past five years has been 15 students making the faculty/student ratio 1:15.

**Success of Transfer Students**

The data for transfer students from the criminal justice program to Oklahoma universities was not available at the time of this reporting.

**Methods and Procedures for Measuring Program Objectives and Outcomes**

The method currently used for measuring success of the program’s objectives and outcomes is a departmental assessment process. The departmental assessment process includes a departmental assessment exam, grade point average, number passing State CLEET certification exam, and number of departmental graduates. In the past 5 years 40 students have chosen to take the State Certification Exam with 38 passing and becoming Full Time CLEET Certified.

**Method and Frequency of Curriculum Review and Evaluation**

Curriculum review and evaluation takes place on a yearly basis through the efforts of the Criminal Justice Department Chairperson. The courses are reviewed and evaluated relevant to their compatibility with transfer universities as well as compliance with job-readiness of certified police officers with the State of Oklahoma. Results and recommendations are forwarded to the Social Science and Music Division Chairperson and Vice President of Academic Affairs and ultimately recommended to the Regents for approval.

Assessment data is utilized for program effectiveness and curriculum review. The data further provides justification for budget request and allocations.

### **Institutional Program Recommendations**

The departmental assessment process gives insight as to the departmental strengths and weaknesses. The departmental assessment instrument revealed that the strengths of the department lie in its strong, consistent academic advisement and course offerings. Having facilitated classroom instruction using a learning styles approach has proven effective as has been revealed through student outcomes assessment. The approach was expedited by the use of videos, technological advances, practical-hands-on experiences which allowed students to be actively involved in their learning.

Online instruction has addressed the needs of the changing student population. All courses for the CRJS major option have been developed for online instruction and are offered in alternate semesters in such a manner that a student can take the majority of his or her course work online.

The Criminal Justice Department truly serves a unique clientele with special needs. Some facilities for educational purposes of this clientele continued to be borrowed or rented placing the departmental outcome dependent upon other agencies. The City of Wilburton and Eastern Oklahoma through a collaborative effort built a firing range which the COP students use during firearms week. However, the previous recommendation that this range be expanded to include the facilities and resources required for a dedicated driving range has never been approved. It is recommended that a cooperative effort be launched between the Oklahoma Department of Corrections, the City of Wilburton and Eastern to build and maintain this facility. All three entities have a need for the driving range.

Finally, it is recommended that the current operating procedures of advisement assessment, instruction and planning be maintained while seeking opportunities for improvement and growth.

**Additional Budget Requests to Accomplish Goals and Objectives**

The previous recommendations have clear budget implications beyond the yearly allocated budget for the Criminal Justice Department. The following table represents those implications as they correlate with the departmental goals and learning objectives.

### **CRIMINAL JUSTICE Course Descriptions**

**CRJS 1113 INTRODUCTION TO CORRECTIONS** An overview of the historical development and a complete analysis of the entire adult corrections systems. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 1123 INTRODUCTION TO CRIMINAL JUSTICE** An overview of the criminal justice system, to include police, courts, and corrections as they pertain to both adults and juveniles. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 1133 INTRODUCTION TO LAW ENFORCEMENT** An overview of police–community relations and the significance of this relationship in the prevention of crime. The various programs and techniques available to facilitate law enforcement will be included. Required of all COP majors. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 1143 JUVENILE DELINQUENCY** Systematic examination of the basic nature of juvenile delinquency. Emphasis placed on juvenile delinquency behavior in relation to family, school, church, peers, community, and institutional structures. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 1211, 1212 CRIMINAL JUSTICE SEMINAR** Studies in selected topics of criminal justice. This course may be repeated with changing topics. (Cr. 1, 2)

**CRJS 1213 CRIMINAL PROCEDURES AND EVIDENCE** A survey of criminal procedures involving laws of arrest, search and seizure, the criminal trial process, collection and processing of evidence, and the use of evidence at criminal trial as well as the Exclusionary Rule, and the Miranda Warning. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 1222 CRISIS INTERVENTION** An overview of crisis situations encountered by professionals in the behavioral science fields with emphasis on the criminal justice professional (Cr. 2)

**CRJS 1233 CRIMINOLOGY** The systematic examination of the cause, prevention, and treatment of crime. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 1253 INVESTIGATIONS** (Prerequisite: CRJS 2123) An overview of the criminal investigation process to include field note taking, report writing, preliminary investigation, crime scene procedures, interview and interrogation, fingerprints, automobile theft, child abuse and exploitation and sexual assaults. Required of all COP majors. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 1311 SPEED-MEASURING DEVICES** A course designed for the purpose of improving speed enforcement through the proper and efficient use of LIDAR and RADAR speed-measuring devices. Required of all COP majors. (Cr. 1)

**CRJS 1322 DWI DETECTION AND STANDARDIZED FIELD SOBRIETY TESTING** A course in recognition, interpretation and report writing for evidence of DWI violations as well as the administration and interpretation of standardized field sobriety tests. Requires of all COP majors. (Cr. 2)

**CRJS 2123 CRIMINAL LAW** An overview of criminal law to include statutory crimes and punishments, classification and elements of crimes, classic defenses of a crime, civil liability and legal research. Required of all COP majors. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 2133 PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT A COP** core course designed to prepare the student in basic firearms shooting skills, in physical fitness, and in studying the CLEET learning objectives for state certification. Required of all COP majors. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 2144 POLICE PATROL AND TRAFFIC PROCEDURES** (Prerequisite: CRJS 1133, CRJS 1253, CRJS 2123) Analysis of the role and duty of the officer in the selection of traffic and patrol methods and functions to include traffic laws, investigation of driver behaviors and traffic collisions. Required of all COP majors and student must be within 15 credit hours of graduation. (Cr. 4)

**CRJS 2233 DEVIANT BEHAVIOR** A review of historical and current theories regarding the causes of criminal behavior in the major types of criminal offenders. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 2251 STRESS MANAGEMENT** An overview of stress situations encountered by professionals in the behavioral science fields with emphasis on the criminal justice professional. (Cr. 1)

**CRJS 2264 FIREARMS TRAINING** (Prerequisite: CRJS 1133, CRJS 1253, CRJS 2123, CRJS 2133, CRJS 2144, PSY 1143, HPER 2102) A police basic skills course in the handgun and shotgun to include nomenclature, maintenance, safety, handling, and shooting of these weapons. Required of all COP Course Descriptions 115 majors and student must be within 15 credit hours of graduation. (Cr. 4)

**CRJS 2272 LAW ENFORCEMENT DRIVER TRAINING (LEDT)** (Prerequisite: CRJS 1133, CRJS 1253, CRJS 2123, CRJS 2133, CRJS 2144, PSY 1143, HPER 2102) A police basic skills course emphasizing skill safety, laws authorizing and controlling police pursuit, and performance of maneuvers required in pursuits. Required of all COP majors and student must be within 15 credit hours of graduation. (Cr. 2)

**CRJS 2283 CUSTODY AND CONTROL** (Prerequisite: CRJS 1133, CRJS 1253, CRJS 2123, CRJS 2133, CRJS 2144, PSY 1143, HPER 2102) A police basic skills course emphasizing the mechanics of arrest, search, transportation of suspects, and legal use of force. Required of all COP majors and student must be within 15 credit hours of graduation. (Cr. 3)

**CRJS 2991, 2992, 2993, 2994 SPECIAL TOPICS** (Cr. 1, 2, 3, 4)
