Description of the program's connection to the institutional mission and goals:

The General Studies program here at Eastern lies at the heart of the institution's mission. As the primary mission is to "facilitate student learning through its associate degrees" and to prepare "graduates to enter their chosen vocational field or to continue their educational experience through baccalaureate degree programs", there is no better path for someone looking to join the workforce with a generalized degree or help them excel further in their baccalaureate degree path than General Studies. "Employment in associate's and postsecondary nondegree-level occupations is projected to grow 11 percent from 2016 to 2026, faster than the 7-percent average projected for all occupations. In occupations typically requiring some college but no degree, employment is projected to grow 4 percent" the United States' Bureau of Labor Statistics Career Outlook website reports in a 2018 article. The General Studies program is geared for students who really do want that extra boost to their salary, post-graduation, but are not sure exactly sure what their specific vocational field is. It shows employers a commitment to seeing projects through. For the student going on to study for their baccalaureate, it gives four-year colleges and universities the opportunity to see these students as serious about their studies and that now they have matured enough to focus on their chosen career.

Mandatory faculty professional development for all academic departments that focus on the use of new technology, teaching strategies, and learning styles.

EOSC has instituted a Professional Development or Assessment day at the beginning of each semester since Fall 2012. Full-time faculty gather together to work on evaluating how they assess the student population academically and culturally, discuss ways to enhance learning, and gain an introduction to the new technological or pedagogical tools they can use to assist students.

Hiring additional faculty to help with the teaching load and allowing time for faculty to take advantage of professional development opportunities.

While the faculty numbers have dwindled slightly due to the budget cuts from the state, the faculty remains steadfast in their mission to teach the students to their utmost ability. EOSC consistently institutes programs for the faculty to take advantage of internally (assessment, brown bag learning lunches, demonstrations by our Instructional Designer and others) and makes available information about external opportunities.

Additional investment in new technology and technical support for online students and faculty.

The Native American Serving Non –Tribal Institutions (NASNTI) grant awarded in October 2010 was a major push in providing new technology for students and faculty. The institution was able to purchase new laptops for online instructors, offer either a laptop or tablet to other faculty, and further upgrade our online LMS and effectively train our instructors on its use.

Additional investment in library collections, databases, and technology with a focus on encouraging student research.

The library has seen an overall uptick in student usage between the last report and now according to our Director of Library and Media Services, Maria Martinez. We have also shifted some of our academic journals from print to digital for easier access and have added an online academic database.

Additional investment to ensure every classroom has up-to-date technology including computers for each student.

Due to budget cuts and concerns, we have not currently been able to move forward with the program to provide each student with a computer. However, we have been able to add Promethean boards to many more classrooms and try to keep the lecture classrooms up to date and the computer labs around campus fully functioning, so both online and traditional students have a place to complete their work should they need.

Opportunities for students to be involved in trips and events to enhance learning, such as guest speakers, art exhibits, concerts, museums, and symposiums both on and off campus.

Our Student Success center has been a big push in taking the students on various cultural trips around the Oklahoma area, including plays and museums. The Student Services department has been instrumental in bringing in speakers on culturally important issues (suicide awareness, Black History Month, etc.). Our Music and Speech/Drama departments have brought in many guest lecturers for both students of their disciplines and the overall school and community population, as well as guest performers in their respective arts. These are just a few examples of the many extra learning events students can participate in.

The Division of Language, Education, and the Humanities of Eastern is open to input from all segments of the institution and the community by offering courses that assist in meeting the demands of an Associate of Arts degree program in General Studies. General Studies is a field that provides students with a well-rounded education and career training for a variety of jobs. The program is designed for students who wish to structure their course work to address particular educational, career, or personal goals. After completing the A.A., graduates may enter universities to major in general studies. The curriculum for a General Studies major consists of freshmen and sophomore level courses from many disciplines. Students in this major may decide to further their education by pursuing a four-year degree or beyond. The curriculum should enable students to enter and succeed in a four-year college or university. The Division of Language, Education, and the Humanities offers day, evening, weekend, on-line, and short-term course designed to enrich the community of learners

with a sound knowledge base that will help them advance their personal, academic, and professional lives.

Eastern offers sections of all the required courses through the following methods of instruction: full lecture, instructional TV (broadcast off-site) lecture, hybrid lecture/online, and fully online courses. This helps meet the demands of students who need or require a classroom setting, those who are physically distant but require or need a classroom setting, those who require some personal instruction but are also adept at working independently, and those who are fully able to work through the assignments with instruction but seek guidance only when needed or are misunderstanding material.

An annual budget is prepared to meet the financial requirements of all college programs. General Studies is an interdisciplinary program supported by budgets of each program of study on campus. Budgets are used for supplies, equipment, telephone, and photocopy expenses, as well as salaries for full-time and adjunct instructors. The primary financial source for all programs comes from state funds and tuition fees.

Eastern's library contains books, newspapers, periodicals, and video media pertaining to every discipline. Computers are available for student use in the libraries on the Wilburton, McAlester, Antlers, and Idabel campuses.

Eastern's facilities are consistently being monitored. As the situation warrants, computer systems and laboratories are maintained and upgraded as cost-effectively as needed.

Support services include: Vice President of Internal and External Affairs, Student Services Coordinator, Housing, Bookstore, Physical Plant, Custodial Staff, Office of Prospective Students; Counselors, Food Services, Financial Aid, Support Services/Tutoring, Business Office, Office of Academic Affairs, Campus Police; and the Offices of Vice-President and President.

The General Studies Program at Eastern utilizes a variety of technology to deliver education to its majors. Multimedia presentations are used to supplement classroom instruction, including the use of interactive Promethean boards. Interactive courses are offered via televised broadcast to three branch campuses and high school. On-line classes delivered by the Blackboard platform are offered as a part of the general curriculum and Eastern's 5 currently obtainable online degrees, including a General Studies degree.

Our faculty is currently utilized in every aspect of the general studies degree due to its interdisciplinary nature.
